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CITY OF BALTIMORE LAUNCHES CORPORATE EMERGENCY ACCESS SYSTEM

Access Control System Helps Business Recover from Emergencies or Disasters

The Business Network of Emergency Resources (BNET) in partnership with City of Baltimore today announced the countywide launch of the Corporate Emergency Access System (CEAS). In the event of a large-scale emergency, CEAS provides companies quick, authorized access to their affected worksites, minimizing economic injury to business and ensuring economic resiliency.

CEAS is an emergency access control system, which authenticates critical business employees for entry to restricted areas following a disaster or serious emergency using a secure identification card recognized by the police. Governments must adopt the CEAS for use in their jurisdiction. Businesses must pre-enroll in the program to be eligible to receive ID cards. The local authorities can implement the **CEAS** following an emergency once immediate threats to life are stabilized. Businesses in City of Baltimore can enroll by going to CEAS.com.

In a downtown press conference hosted Wednesday at 100 Light Street, the City's new CEAS program was unveiled. "The CEAS will enable businesses to mitigate losses and recover quicker by facilitating access to their buildings. We must assist the private sector to maintain continuity of operations – the City depends on it.", said Robert Maloney, Director of the Mayor's Office of Emergency Management.

"Baltimore's CEAS partnership creates a tangible bond that elevates area businesses to a place where they should be during an emergency or disaster as true partners in response and recovery", said Peter Picarillo, Executive Director of BNET.

"Whether it's a water main break or something more serious, the CEAS credentialing system gives stakeholders and business one less thing to worry about when there is an emergency," said Kirby Fowler, President of the Downtown Partnership of Baltimore.

Also In attendance at yesterday's press conference was, City of Baltimore, Deputy Mayor, Christopher Thomascutty, Baltimore Police Lt. Col. Paul Sheppard and Baltimore Fire Deputy Chief Donald Heinbuch.

BNET's CEAS has already been implemented in six northeastern cities and their suburban Counties. More locales nationwide are expected to participate in the near future.

BNET, a New York-based not-for-profit corporation, will manage the CEAS. Member companies cover the program's administrative costs of the program through a per card fee. There is no financial cost to the City. Small, medium, and large companies are all invited to enroll.
